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### Best first-class flights JAL, Lufthansa

They may not shout as loudly as their Middle Eastern adversaries but the firstclass offerings on both Japan Airlines (JAL) and Lufthansa are a cut above the rest in terms of their attention to detail.

JAL doesn't brag about its JAL Sky Suite 777 but it probably should. The lie-flat seat converts into a bed and passengers have a choice of hard or soft mattresses. To top it off, an amenity kit designed in collaboration with Spanish fashion house Loewe will ensure that you arrive freshfaced for your first meeting.

We appreciate an airline investing in its existing fleet as Lufthansa has in the first-class cabins of its Boeing 747-400s. The German carrier added a smart recliner to the mix and an adjacent bunk to up the offer. Book it while you can as the 747s won't be around forever; Lufthansa's newer first-class offering on the Airbus A380 has an upgraded lie-flat seat but no bed. — TMA jal.com; lufthansa.com

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### Most sensible pass-around meal concept ANA's crudités

It can be hard to drum up enthusiasm for airline food but All Nippon Airways (ANA) has come up with a delightfully simple offering for its business-class passengers on the Haneda to Singapore route: refreshing crudités and tasty snacks. Passengers can pick from a canapé-esque selection that includes cucumber and carrot sticks with a southern island dressing, marinated prawns and wasabi peas a Japanese favourite. Masaru Watanabe (pictured) joined the Palace Hotel staff 28 years ago at the age of 22 and has been here ever since. Watanabe has done almost every job in the hotel, starting as a bellboy and working his way up through banquet waiting and sales until he was made executive director and general manager in 2012, when the hotel reopened after a three-year rebuild. It says much for the company that it kept 90 per cent of its 500-strong staff on payroll during the hiatus, determined that the service would be as good as ever when the hotel reopened.
