

ocated across from the Imperial Palace Gardens, the Palace Hotel Tokyo has been an iconic fixture on the city's luxury hotel scene since the 1960s. In 2009, the hotel underwent a complete rebuild before opening its doors again three years later, reinterpreted with understated luxury and subtle Japanese touches. Today, it stands as the only Japaneseowned and managed hotel to garner the prestigious Forbes Five-Star rating – a true testament to its level of distinction.

## **Amidst Nature**

Palace Hotel Tokyo comprises 278 guestrooms and 12 suites, more than half of which feature private balconies. Unusual for a hotel in downtown Tokyo, the balconies look out to the beautifully landscaped Imperial Palace Gardens and on a clear day, guests can catch a glimpse of Mt Fuji in the distance. Each room is luxuriously cozy, with leafy carpet motifs and earthy colour palettes that invoke the hotel's close proximity to Tokyo's natural splendour.

## **Exquisite Relaxation**

Aside from a swimming pool with jacuzzi and a 127 sq m fitness centre, the hotel's fifth floor is home to Japan's only Evian Spa. The 1,200 sq m Evian

Spa Tokyo encompasses five treatment rooms, one spa suite and two relaxation lounges separated by gender. Inspired by the natural cycle of Evian water within the Alps, treatments are themed around celestial restoration, mineral enrichment, precious nourishment and renewed vitality. The Vitalizing Signature Treatment, for example, is a therapeutic blend of Japanese *seitai* trigger-point style bodywork combined with Swedish deep-tissue massage.

## **Culinary Perfection**

Doing justice to Japan's reputation as a culinary destination, Palace Hotel Tokyo also boasts a constellation of restaurants. Guests can start the day with a lavish breakfast spread at the Grand Kitchen while enjoying the peaceful moat-side setting. The hotel's Japanese offerings include exquisite kaiseki (multi-course Japanese dinner) at Wadakura, sumptuous teppanyaki at GO, delectable tempura at Tatsumi and top flight sushi at Sushi Kanesaka. The hotel also hosts one-Michelin starred restaurant Amber Palace that serves up the city's finest Chinese cuisine.
